## *“It’s About Living Every Moment”*

The thought of grocery shopping makes most of us sigh and raise our eyes skyward and Damita was no different until recently. Just 44 years old Damita Armstrong has always lived life to the full and while she is not about to stop, life has changed. She no longer rushes from one thing to the next and taking time to hand select her tomatoes and potatoes is savoured.

Late in 2003 Damita was diagnosed with a very rare form of ovarian cancer. After three 6-month bouts of chemotherapy over a three year period and a small stint of radiotherapy, Damita was not only extremely ill, she was not expected to live for more than two weeks.

At that point the people from hospice entered her life and things began to change.

*“When I first heard I was being referred to hospice care, I thought, oh*

*no this can't be good. I couldn't have been more wrong.”*

Initially under the care of Franklin Hospice and now Mercy Hospice Auckland, Damita says it was the hospice people that stood out for her. *“It doesn't matter who it is, a staff member, a volunteer, a doctor - the hospice people are incredible. You feel this overwhelming sense of support and of being safe.”*

Husband David, who has given up his job to care fulltime for Damita,

*agrees. “It's like a community, they truly care for both of us. I don't know what we would do without them.”*

Damita admits her initial concerns about hospice were based on a lack of contact and understanding of what a hospice actually does. *“Hospice had never touched my life and I thought is this it, am I going to die in a hospice? But that's not what hospice is about at all.”*

When Mercy Hospice began caring for Damita she had been totally debilitated by constant vomiting over a two month period. After 24 hours under hospice care, the vomiting was under control. *“They are absolute specialists in what they do. They know so much about pain management and they care not only for me but also my family. Hospice is a gift.”*

Damita is cared for mostly at home by David, supported by frequent home visits from hospice staff and volunteers. It is exactly what Damita and David want. *“I love being in my own home surrounded by photos of our children and grandchildren, pottering around in our garden, instructing David on how to bake a pavlova from my chair.”*

When Damita's pain relief needs to be adjusted or David needs some time out, there is no place she'd rather be than Mercy Hospice.

*“When we first went to Mercy Hospice we were stunned. It was like a hotel, she loved it, which makes it much easier to leave her when I go home.”*

David feels hospice support goes well beyond the patient.

*“I feel I could ring hospice any time,*

*not just for Damita's needs but mine too. Attending the support group for families of patients has been invaluable. Since hospice has been involved in our lives they have removed the hassles we previously faced. They deal with the forms and the bureaucracy. I remember trying to hire a wheelchair elsewhere for Damita. It was hopeless. I mentioned it to hospice and they sorted it in a day."*

David says seeing Damita happy means so much to him. *"When I drop Damita off for the "Day Stay" (Open Doors Programme) I hang around for a while because the people are so positive, it's like one big family. To see Damita being pampered is just the best. She's had her nails done, massages, aromatherapy - you name it. I'm so grateful for hospice and what they do."*

Damita has no problem admitting David is a saint. He has willingly given up his job, many of his interests and time with his mates to be there for Damita. It has taken their relationship to a new level. *"We can get up each others' noses but that's out of frustration. It's hard for me to be so reliant on David. I'm used to being a strong, independent woman, but I have no idea what I would do without him. My illness has taught me it is the simple things in life that are most important."*

When Damita is well enough there is nothing they love more than spending

time with their grandchildren Mason and Kade. Whether it's four year old Mason's weekly swimming lesson, a picnic in the park or babysitting on a Wednesday night, just being together is what matters most.



*"The concept of time has changed for me. I see people rushing around, working long hours, striving for the next asset on the list. Time is so precious and when we're young we truly believe it's endless. If I could teach people one thing it would be to give freely of their time and make time for others, particularly to the people they love. It's hugely rewarding."*

And as she reflects, Damita quickly adds, *"But don't write me off. I'm alive and I've still got things to do and see. Hospice has reminded me it's about living every moment and that's exactly what I am doing."*

## Out of the Mouths of Babes

Damita was teaching at Puhinui Primary, Papatoetoe when she was diagnosed. She had been up front and honest with the children about the cancer and the treatment she would be facing.

One day as she outlined the maths lesson, innocently she ran her hands through her hair to find a clump of it had come loose as a result of the chemotherapy. For a brief moment teacher and pupils froze. Then from the corner of her eye, Damita saw a hand shoot up, waving furiously.

*"Yes, what is it Eseta?"*

*"Mrs Armstrong, could I please have some of your hair?"*

Any awkwardness that might have been was gone, Eseta bolted to the front of the class to claim her section of Damita's hair. Within seconds another hand shoots up and another and before long Damita's hair was almost gone. Her hair had become a prized possession which the children treasured in their exercise books, taped to their desks and put in school bag pockets to take home.

*"I wondered had I been with a group of adults how might they have reacted?"*

*We can learn so much from kids, they live in the moment. It was one of those treasured life lessons."*

# Our CEO looks forward

Some things are certain. The need for hospice and palliative care services will only continue to grow. We know this because referral numbers continue to increase and more people need our beds, visits in the community and other aspects of our service. This is backed up by a recent very comprehensive report commissioned by Auckland District Health Board which has helped to

quantify large areas of unmet need which remain in our community. This need will grow unless our services reorientate and palliative care expertise expands across the health sector.

Another certainty we face is that we will continue to need vast amounts of support from our community to fund our service. Hospice New Zealand, our national body, has commenced discussions with the new National

Government about their election pledge to inject new funds into hospice services. However, decisions are some time away and the most we can expect is that funding will reach 70% of our operating costs. That means we will still need to raise close to \$2 million net each year the equivalent of \$5,479 each day.

Our greatest uncertainties relate to how easily those funds will be realised.

## Mercy Hospice Auckland 1979-2009 Celebrating Thirty Years of Service

Mercy Hospice Auckland is one of New Zealand's three pioneering hospices, first opening in 1979. Care for the dying has been integral to the work of the Sisters of Mercy since their foundation in Ireland in the 19th Century.

The Sisters served the Auckland community in this work for many decades after their arrival in New Zealand in 1850. However it was the advent of the modern hospice movement that heightened calls from health professionals and the public alike for a more holistic approach across the health sector to people facing incurable illness.

The Mater Misericordiae Hospital (later Mercy Hospital) was well placed to take the lead with a new initiative. The maternity wards had recently closed, a spare ward was available and the opportunity to provide hospice care fitted with the Sisters' mission and desire to provide valuable community service. Sister Margaret Timms, who

was to manage the service for 13 years, travelled to St Christophers and other hospices in the UK to receive hands-on training and experience.

Once opened in August 1979 the St Josephs Unit as it was known was also supported by the three doctors who had long advocated for a facility of this type - Dr's Graeme Campbell, Leo Cooney and Tom Marshall.

Throughout the 1980s the beds at St Josephs (or St Joe's as it was affectionately known by some) catered for people throughout the entire Auckland region. Sister Margaret and the hospice staff were called on to teach and mentor across the country as the hospice movement quickly

expanded (there are now 37 hospices in New Zealand).

Hospice nurses were also fundraisers. Sister Margaret and her team ran raffles and did whatever they could to raise the extra funds needed to run the hospice. Mercy Hospital and its Auxiliary Service Guild generously provided or raised funds in a variety of ways.

Sister Margaret's service to the community was acknowledged when she was awarded a CBE. Dr Tom Marshall was awarded an OBE in 1996, recognising his hospice service amongst other accomplishments.

## Alan McIntyre - A Marathon Effort

In 2008 a group of colleagues and I put together a team to run the London Marathon. We came up with the idea of running for charity and developed a website for recording donations. Each team member has nominated their chosen charity. My nominated charity is Mercy Hospice Auckland. My wife Veronica volunteers at Mercy Hospice Auckland as a community support person for those suffering with a terminal illness. Over the years I have had friends that have developed cancer - some have survived and others have not.

I started running in 1996 to get fit and the goal was to enter a corporate triathlon. Although I still do triathlons, I clearly got the running bug and have run 97 half marathons in New Zealand,

Australia and now the Middle East.

In January 2008 I moved to Dubai. People ask me what it's like running here.

Apart from dodging all the construction vehicles it is OK. Weather-wise from October through to May the temperatures are fine. I run in the early morning and at the moment the temperature is around 20°C. In the summer months the minimum temperature is 30°C, as long as the sun is not up.

## IRD has lifted the refund limit on charitable donations

**A reminder as the financial year comes to a close.**

**Individuals:** Any individual who makes a gift of \$5 or more to a charitable organisation from 2008/09 tax year onwards can claim 1/3 of their taxable income or 1/3 of the total donations made in that tax year, whichever is the lesser amount.

**Companies:** Companies are now entitled to deduct from their net income any donations made to a charitable organisation as an expense. The total amount that can be deducted is limited only by the amount of the company's net income.
