A very warm welcome and a heartfelt thank you to everyone who has supported

Mercy Hospice throughout this year. With Christmas fast approaching, the team here continues to provide exceptional care right across Auckland.

Our Community Nursing team has made over 3,600 visits to our patients since April, providing essential care to them in their homes. Our Family Support team has also provided exceptional support and care with over 500 family visits this year.

Overall, Mercy Hospice has received over 650 referrals to our service in that same period, showing the demand and need for our specialist care is growing rapidly.

Supporting us in all areas of our service, has been a fantastic Volunteer team, who collectively have given over 26.000 hours so far this year in supporting our patients, staff and retail shops. We have invested in recruiting a new Volunteer Manager, specifically for Retail and Fundraising, to work alongside Nix Johnson who manages the Volunteers for patient support. Also, they will be using a brand-new database tool to help with managing the 600+ volunteers we are so very grateful to have working for us. In 2020 we will be providing better communication to our volunteers using a new website and newsletter service, this will be available very soon.

In everything we are doing at present, we are working towards our goal of providing more access to Specialist Palliative care across Auckland, especially to those most in need and the vulnerable. Significant progress is being made with initiatives to further develop our services, and there is always more we could do.

The most incredible part of my job is meeting people who express their thanks and share stories about what it has meant to them, their families and loved ones, to have Mercy Hospice alongside them. Meeting and talking allows our community to be closer together, and our staff all wish to thank each and every one of you for sharing your stories with us. I often walk around our Hospice and ask how they are going. Mostly, a humble response saying, "we are busy... and ok". Well, I know 'busy and ok' often comes with a heavy burden on their shoulders, but one that is lifted by the support and those kind messages you all give us, and for that I want to thank you all.

I am delighted to introduce the newly appointed Chairman of the Mercy Hospice board, Dr Arthur Morris. Arthur succeeds Denis Wood who served as Chair for the past 15 years and recently retired from the board. We had the pleasure of honouring and thanking Denis at our 40th Ruby anniversary celebration.

Arthur has been a member of the Mercy Hospice board for the past 4 years. He is a fellow of the Royal College of Pathologists of Australasia, the former CEO of Diagnostic Medlab and currently an independent director of Southern Cross Hospitals. As you may know, all our board positions are voluntary.



New Volunteer Opportunities

We would like to train and use volunteer leaders to support the two Volunteer Co-Ordinators in their new roles. This is a wonderful opportunity for a couple of volunteers to work alongside and help develop new ways of working with other volunteers. It is envisaged that responsibilities within volunteer management can be cascaded, and that the volunteer leaders will be able to support and cover for each other, and the Volunteer Co-Ordinators, for urgent or unplanned activities.

More In-Depth Training for Volunteers

Many of you have mentioned that in the past you completed a six-week training programme in the basics of palliative care. The Volunteer Co-Ordinators are in the process of working with our Clinical Education Team, the Community Patient Care Nurses, the Family Support Team, and Geraldine Northey, our volunteer representative on the Health & Safety Committee, to put together a more comprehensive training programme for those volunteers involved with direct patient contact.

Fundraising – a chance to become involved with our fresh, fun, and innovative Fundraising Team. They always surprise with their imaginative ideas for raising the ever-needed funds to run Mercy Hospice.

Reception - these volunteers are the Face of Mercy Hospice. This is an area where volunteers come into daily contact with staff, patients' families and friends, and all visitors to Mercy Hospice.

In Patient Unit – tea and drinks trollies twice daily, flowers, aromatherapy and massage.

Volunteering in the In Patient Unit are the most sought after roles, once a volunteer has a permanent shift, is very unwilling to give it up, sometimes for many years. One volunteer has been doing the flowers for 25 years!

Community – companionship. A very rewarding role where a volunteer can make a real difference to a patient's life by taking them out shopping or for coffee, just sitting with them or reading to them, or to give respite to a tired caregiver. The variations are endless but offer a bright light to many patients.

Transport – a very much needed role in the day to day lives of our community patients, where they are driven to and collected from their appointments which may range from anything such as chemotherapy or a hair appointment.

Manaaki – an opportunity to transport patients and or their caregivers into the Hospice for Manaaki Active, a weekly gentle exercise programme, or to the Manaaki Programme which is a social, educational programme for patients and carers where they are provided with information and support

and have the opportunity to meet with others having similar experiences. The programme is offered over a 13-week period and is repeated during the year.

Life Reviews - a specialised and very rewarding area of volunteering that requires attendance of a day-long workshop run by our head Life Reviewer, where volunteers are trained on how to record and transcribe a patient's life story. The ability to "listen" is a great skill for this role.

Baking/Catering - a Hospice speciality. Nothing happens at Mercy without a good cup of tea and a piece of home-made baking, especially scones! We welcome home cooking for many of our functions, so this is a great opportunity to show off your baking and decorating skills!

Hairdressing, manicures/ pedicures, makeup - help give a patient dignity by making them feel better about themselves and their personal appearance.

We welcome the offer of any skills that volunteers think may be of service at Mercy. You tell us what you shine at and we will endeavour to use your talents.

We look forwards to working with your all again next year.



My family and I have always known about the hospice as we lived in Herne Bay but it was 10 years ago when my late wife Aldyth was not well that we really became aware of the wonderful care that Mercy provides.

We came in to see one of the doctors and were very impressed with the way we were treated. Aldyth was cared for at home by hospice nurses and because of this, was able to die where she wanted to.

In November of that year I bought her a Pohutukawa Flower on Mercy's Remembrance Tree in memory of our happy lives together.

A year later I decided to support Mercy Hospice with a monthly donation as well as bequesting a legacy to Mercy in my Will.

In 2015 my daughter Toni become ill which was extremely sadher three children were just teenagers. Toni wanted to be cared for at home by the Mercy team and during her illness she made sure she spent special time with each of her children and her husband. When her time came she spoke to each family member individually to say goodbye – she was a very brave woman. On the night that she died she called me back to say good night to me.

Both my wife and my daughter were able to die at home all because of the amazing team at Mercy Hospice.

We would not be able to manage it without them.



9125 days is how long I got to spend with my husband. To some of you that seems like a huge number but to me it's nowhere near enough. I wish we could have gotten to 10,000 or even just 9126. I think daily - why couldn't I have had just one more day, but then I suppose one more day would never be enough.

I was 21 when I met Jason, he was and is the love of my life. Our life together was beautiful, we have 4 amazing children and it was probably similar to yours; it consisted of work, family and getting on with living, or so we thought.

Jason was 45 when he was diagnosed with terminal cancer. We went into an appointment thinking it would be nothing and came out with 10 months to live. It hit us like a sledgehammer.

Shock. Disbelief. Horror. No words can describe that feeling. Everything went into a blur and all I remember thinking was not us, not my strong, fit, young, healthy, doesn't-even-visit-the-doctor husband but the reality was

that it was us and it was Jason. This was now our reality.

Jason beat the 10 months, but it came to a point we were told hospice care was the next step and what can I say...

Mercy Hospice, from the moment we arrived it was a home away from home - you felt protected and looked after...like a ring of fire had been put around you and that fire was all the team from Hospice saying 'we've got you'.

Jason died on the 26th March 2018 surrounded by his family and looked after in a way I could never have dreamed of. The care and compassion these people give to the patients and their entire family is unbelievable and 18 months down the line they are still here still supporting us in this journey none of us wanted to go on. I cannot thank them enough.

However, I know its more than just the team at Mercy. I know that it's because of people like you who donate or attend events that Mercy can continue to keep their doors open. I am only too aware that Mercy Hospice needs to raise \$4 million each year and I want to help.

I would like to set up a group called 'Project Widows/ Widowers' and ask anyone who has had a loved one cared for at Mercy to join me.

My vison for 'Project Widows' is to not only raise much needed funds for our hospice but to create a support network of people who have shared experiences and eventually help others who are going to embark on the same journey.

colleagues. It is vital that they
have ongoing and regular
training to ensure they are fully
equipped with the knowledge
and skills to provide palliative
care either here at hospice or in
the community.

Our Learning and Development team here at Mercy hospice offer a wide range of education courses throughout the year from Fundamentals of palliative care to syringe driver practical sessions. These courses are available to our staff at hospice as well as external professionals from age residential care facilities, and even pharmacists!

As we can all appreciate, clinical work isn't 9-5, so attending education and training can sometimes be difficult for our doctors, nurses and health care assistants. We want to ensure that people can easily access education and training at a time that is convenient for them, therefore we are going to be moving into the E-Learning space! We want to offer a blend of learning that supports not only our clinical colleagues but patients and their families too.

We recognise that there is a strong need for training, particularly in the wider community, and whilst we would love to reach everyone face to face we know it isn't feasible, so by taking advantage of online tools we can enable people to learn and educate themselves at their own pace and at a time that is suitable for them.



e're not from New Zealand, my husband Zach and I have been here for 8 years now. We came here to start a law firm together, that was exciting because we became life partners and business partners together. We had just had a baby and suddenly he started to become tired. My husband is one of those people who doesn't get tired, he's a can do guy, so for me to hear that he's tired was concerning, but we chalked it up to being geriatric parents. I found out at this point that I was also pregnant again, which meant Zach became protective and

wasn't telling me about his persistent headaches or how tired he was feeling.

Not long after this I miscarried, from then it was a whirlwind of doctors tests, then travel to the US for treatment with me travelling back and forth to keep the business afloat here in New Zealand. He was diagnosed with an inoperable tumour. I had to provide for our family, work a night job in America from New Zealand on top of keeping up with my clients here. I spoke to my therapist and she said "Ada, you can't do this yourself, you need

help." I didn't know who to contact or how. She told me to talk to my GP and my GP immediately put the call out.

Mercy Hospice reached out to me all of a sudden on Monday, it was like an army of people had showed up through Mercy. The community nurse came, an assisted cooking person came, Zach's injections were being taken care of. It felt like a rescue mission because I was feeling like if something didn't happen, I was going to faint.
